KTEC Campus Radio Station

The campus radio station, KTEC-FM (89.5) is operated under a license issued to the Oregon State Board of Higher Education. KTEC is the oldest FM station in southern Oregon and provides opportunities for any student interested in radio and music to gain experience and working knowledge of a broadcast station and to develop skills and creative ability. The station also provides campus entertainment and public service to the community and campus within its broadcast range. No background is necessary and all interested persons are urged to drop by with questions. Credit hours per term may be earned for this activity.

The Edge—Campus Newspaper

A student-produced campus newspaper, *The Edge*, is a weekly tabloid written by communication studies majors and produced by a student staff. It provides general campus news, information of interest and important announcements. Editorials and letters expressing student opinion on student government and activities are also included. Three credit hours per term may be earned for this activity.

Oregon Technical Broadcasting (OTB)

OTB is the student-run video production program at OIT. OTB provides the campus entertainment through the creation of a sketch comedy show called Outside the Box. New episodes of this show are created each term. In addition to this, OTB films campus events, operates the closed circuit TV station on campus, and provides video services to campus organizations who request them. Anyone who is interested in TV/video/film productions, acting, or comedy is encouraged to get involved with OTB. No previous experience is necessary and all are welcome!

Outdoor Program (OP)

The OIT Outdoor Program provides an opportunity to participate in outdoor activities including rafting, caving, mountain climbing, hiking and skiing. Most trips are offered at little or no cost. No previous experience is necessary to enjoy the program. Events and activities are planned for both beginners and advanced adventurers. In addition to sponsoring trips, the OP also offers low-cost rental equipment for a variety of outdoor activities.

Students planning a weekend expedition don't have to buy expensive equipment. The OP has canoes, tents, backpacks, cross-country skis and much more available at a nominal cost. If you are searching for

Through club representatives, students can participate indirectly in the Student Senate and promote clubs within the OIT community.

Academic & Professional Clubs

American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE)

The Associated Students of Civil Engineering (ASCE) is dedicated to the professional development of students and faculty on campus. ASCE serves its members through biweekly meetings, guest speakers, student convention and seminars, and field education tours. ASCE also serves the campus and community through improvement projects. Membership is open to all students for a nominal fee.

American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME)

This organization is chartered by the national ASME. Its purpose is the advancement and dissemination of knowledge of the theory and practice of mechanical engineering, the presentation of proper perspective of engineering work and the opportunity to become acquainted with the personnel and activities of the society. Professional awareness and fellowship are promoted through field trips to engineering oriented facilities and guest lecturers at monthly meetings. Membership is open to students enrolled in the Mechanical Engineering Technology curriculum.

Computer Systems Society

This organization is for the continued learning of computer knowledge in the pursuit of a higher degree of education.

Dental Hygiene

The purpose of this organization is to provide opportunities for students to learn more about dental hygiene, cultivate, promote and sustain the art and science of dental hygiene, to represent and safeguard the common interest of the members of the dental hygiene profession, and contribute toward the improvement of public health. In addition, students develop a respect for education in the dental hygiene field, which contributes to occupational competence.

Diagnostic Medical Sonography (DMS)

The purpose is to investigate other means of enhancing the scope and quality of education, organize field trips, further the community's knowledge of ultrasound in the medical field, present speakers from within the industry of DMS and cooperate in public service projects.

Echocardiography Club

The purpose of this club is to provide support for echocardiography students by means of educational programs and the sharing of information.

Engineers Without Borders (EWB)

The purpose of this club is to reflect and support the values and mission of EWB-USA.

Health Sciences & Biology Club

It shall be the purpose of this organization to:

- 1) Provide a forum in which Health Science undergraduates have a means of obtaining academic support (i.e., tutoring services, study groups, etc.) and career information.
- 2) Engage in social functions designed to provide psychological support to Health Science undergraduates to enhance their academic experience.
- 3) Participate in philanthropic activities in order to promote community relations between OIT and the Klamath Falls community.

Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (IEEE)

The purpose of the IEEE is to allow members to experience the engineering profession by doing engineering projects that allow its members to work collectively in a group. Also by being a member the student gets exposure to many companies through the field trips that we as a group put together.

Nuclear Medicine Technology Club (NMTC)

The goal of this organization shall be to promote the field of Nuclear Medicine Technology, uphold the aspects of the NMT profession, and stimulate academic and social interaction between all NMT students.

Oregon Student Vascular Association (OSVA)

The purpose of this organization is for a scientific and organizational atmosphere. It provides support for vascular technology students by means of educational programs and sharing of information. It enhances the scope and quality of education, presents guest speakers from within the industry of vascular technology, organizes field trips and cooperates in public service projects.

Oregon Tech Accounting Club (OTAC)

OTAC's purpose is to help students interested in the accounting profession come into contact with businesses and gain first hand job interaction and networking skills.

Oregon Tech Student Marketing Association (OTSMA)

The mission of the Oregon Tech Student Marketing Association is to provide a supportive and enjoyable atmosphere where students will be empowered to identify and seize opportunities while experiencing marketing concepts that will enhance personal and professional growth.

Professional Land Surveyors of Oregon (PLSO)

The objective of the club is to encourage the development of a professional consciousness, to afford an opportunity for surveying students to become acquainted and to practice working together effectively, to promote a spirit of congeniality among them, and to provide friendly contact with professional practitioners.

Psychology Club

This organization promotes interest and provides social, educational and networking opportunities to the students of the Applied Psychology program.

Radiologic Science Club (RDSC)

The objectives of this organization include promoting the field of radiologic science technology, upholding the ethical aspects of the profession and stimulating academic and social interaction between all students in the Radiologic Science Technology program. Money earned from fundraising projects supports student travel to the annual conventions and club activities. Membership is open to all students enrolled in the program.

Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE)

The purpose of this organization shall be to promote the arts and sciences of engineering practices connected with design, construction, utilization of self-propelled machines, prime movers, components

thereof, and related equipment, and to encourage good fellowship among engineering students in a structured organization.

Society of Manufacturing Engineers (SME)

SME is the second largest non-profit professional organization in the United States. The Society's mission is aimed at the advancement of all manufacturing disciplines through the continuing education and networking of its members. Activities include industry visitation field trips and social functions, and an occasional guest speaker. Teamwork and cooperation among members are encouraged. Areas of interest range from computer-aided systems, robotics and electronics to many other forms of manufacturing, production and development. SME membership includes CSET, EET, MET and MFG students.

Students in Communication (SIC)

The Students in Communication (SIC) is a club open to all students interested in communication. The club is a chapter of the Students in Communication affiliated with the National Communication Association. The Students in Communication provide advice to the Communication Studies major, mentor students interested in communication, serve the campus and community, and promote scholarship in communication.

Honorary

Alpha Chi

The purpose of Alpha Chi is the promotion and recognition of scholarship and those elements of character which make scholarship effective among the students in the academic divisions of colleges and universities in the United States and other countries. Essential qualifications for active membership include regular undergraduate junior or senior standing and high scholarship.

Lamda Pi Eta

The name of the National Communication Association's Honor Society shall be Lamda Pi Eta. The purpose of Lamda Pi Eta shall be: a) to recognize, foster and reward outstanding scholastic achievement in communication studies; b) to stimulate interest in the field of communications; c) to promote and encourage professional development among communication majors; d) to provide an opportunity to discuss and exchange ideas in the field of communications.

Psi Chi

Psi Chi is a National Honor Society for Psychology students. It recognizes students for their scholarship and service to the field of psychology and service to their community. Students who are eligible for Psi Chi must be in an Applied Psychology major, have completed at least five quarters of their academic program and be maintaining a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or above. Information may be obtained from any psychology faculty member.

Phi Theta Kappa

The Kappa Chi chapter represents this national scholastic honorary society on the OIT campus. Phi Theta Kappa promotes academic excellence, develops good moral character and cultivates leadership qualities. Membership requirements include two successive terms with a 3.5 GPA, freshman or sophomore standing, junior transfers and pledges by invitation.

Tau Alpha Pi

The Alpha Oregon chapter is a National Honor Society which provides recognition for a high standard of academic achievement among students in the Engineering Technologies. The scholastic requirements and standards for membership include a minimum of 36 degree credits, and only the upper 4% per term of all students majoring in an engineering technology baccalaureate degree program are eligible. No student shall be inducted as a member of the Society with a GPA lower than 3.20.

Social, Cultural, Leadership & International

Gay-Straight Alliance (GSA)

The Oregon Gay-Straight Alliance exists to provide a friendly, inclusive atmosphere where all students, regardless of sexual orientation, ethnicity, or religion can meet, socialize, and share their views on issues related to sexual orientation.

Health Fitness Club

A fun, safe, supportive club to workout and find others to workout with. They also do fun workout activities like hiking.

Campus Crusade for Christ

Campus Crusade for Christ is an interdenominational, student, Christian organization seeking to provide a spiritual environment for students. Campus Crusade for Christ exists to provide regular opportunities to study and discuss the Bible, worship, and pray, all in a group setting, which also provides opportunities for fellowship, encouragement and spiritual development among members.

Christian Fellowship

Service

Residence Hall Association (RHA)

Each student living in the Residence Halls Complex is automatically a member of the Residence Hall Association. The organization works with Residence Life staff to promote, organize, coordinate and implement program activities for Residence Hall students. Throughout the course of the year, RHA sponsors events and activities to provide social, cultural and educational enrichment. RHA also serves as a liaison to convey legitimate resident student concerns related to housing, food service and development programs for students in order to provide an educational environment that maximizes opportunities for student growth, development and equal access to education.

Athletics

Intercollegiate

The OIT Men's Athletic Program stresses competitive excellence and a full opportunity for student athletes to seek a balanced education. OIT is a member of the Cascade Collegiate Conference, which is affiliated with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The "Hustlin' Owls" participate in soccer and cross country in the fall, basketball in the winter. During the spring, the Owls participate in baseball and track & field.

Intercollegiate athletics for women provide experiences beyond the classroom. The program is designed for highly skilled women to compete against teams of comparable ability from other schools. OIT holds membership in the Cascade Collegiate Conference and is also affiliated with the National Association of Inter-collegiate Athletics (NAIA). Softball, volleyball, basketball, soccer, cross country, and track and field are offered.

Tech Fit

OIT's Athletics, Recreation and Fitness Education Center has many facilities, fitness and education opportunities. A new expansion off the front of the center provides students with an expanded cardiovascular workout area. A free-weight room stocked with all the needed equipment is located downstairs on the east side. A 6-lane, 25 meter swimming pool is used for swim teams as well as lap swimming and open recreation. There tennis courts, an 8-lane, 400 meter, all weather surface track and a lighted basketball court for your outdoor recreation. Also, watch for a lawn volleyball net as it tends to move around campus.

The Tech Fit Center is open to all OIT students taking at least eight credits for no additional charge. Students taking less than eight credits may sign up in either credit or non-credit classes for a minimal charge. For more information, call Lonna at 885-1634.
