8. Call to Order/Roll/Declaration of a Quorum Chair Brown called the meeting to order at 10:43am. The Board Secretary called roll and a quorum was declared.

9. Consent Agenda

2.1 Approve Minutes from January 27, 2022 Meeting

No changes voiced. Minutes approved as submitted.

10. Reports

3.1 Academic Affairs, Admissions and Strategic Enrollment Management

Dr. Mott reviewed her report included in the agenda which addressed Academic Affairs and Strategic Enrollment Management staffing, the progression of the Academic Master Plan. She shared an update on academic programs which include two requests to offer degrees are pending approval from the Higher Education Coordinating Commission. The Assessment Executive Committee is in the process of reading and scoring all Program Assessment Reports submitted for the 2020-21 academic year. Dr. Mott reported that YuJa, the new classroom capture and video teaching and learning tool platform has been well received; and All Simple Syllabus, an institutional-wide syllabus repository integrated within Canvas vendor demonstrations have been completed. She advised that the National Survey of Student Engagement will be administered at Oregon Tech beginning April 4, 2022, and the Faculty Survey of Student Engagement will begin on April 5, 2022 for faculty. Dr. Mott provided updates for the college of Engineering Technology and Management and the college of Health, Arts and Sciences new initiatives. She also addressed Financial Aid, Academic Advising and Retention, Admissions, Education Partnerships and Outreach. She reported that a Director for the Sponsored Programs & Grants Administration has been hired, which will greatly support faculty write grants. Dr. Mott reported the search for the Dean of Online Education Global Engagement position is in the final stages, and the search for an external Chair for Natural Sciences is underway. Dr. Mott shared that Oregon Tech has been reaccredited for ten years; and there were 12 applicants for tenure, all of whom have been approved.

3.2 Student Affairs

Dr. Foley reviewed her report included in the agenda which included an update on Oregon Tech winter and spring sports stats: Women's Basketball 19-11, Men's Basketball 22-11 overall, Oregon Tech hosted a Golf tournament in Medford and both the men and women took first place. Baseball is currently 19-9 and softball is currently 26-4 and ranked #1 in the NAIA. Dr. Foley reported that medical calls for Campus Safety are on the rise, and there is an uptick in transients and petty thieves passing through. She mentined upcoming special events requiring a security detail. Dr. Foley reported that some students are discussing the distinction between student and employee parking. She reports that CARES is still very short staffed, but active recruiting for the Coordinator of Peer Consulting/Supplemental Instruction and the Coordinator for Portland-Metro SIS are process. ACES reported for Winter term 361 requests from 251 students, and Spring term 28 requests have been received so far. There are 160 current active students, and 96% of active TOP students are registered for Spring term. Dr. Foley reported that Fall 2022

student housing contract numbers continue to exceed numbers from last year (514 contracts as of March 21, 2022), up from 419 last year. Dr. Foley reported that student engagement is up, due to more face-to-face activities. She also addressed that student hiring is underway, especially in housing for next year.

5.1 InventOR Student Presentation (10:50am) (20 min) Hanna Wolf & Mario Segura Hanna and Mario shared their winning InventOR, an environmentally considerate renewable energy project, the Electerro Lumen Tree with unique solar leaves.

5.2 Review Academic Master Plan Mission & Vision (11:10am) (10 min)

Provost and VP for Academic Affairs and Strategic Enrollment & Dean Dan Peterson

Dean Peterson discussed the four charges issued by Dr. Mott: 1) to develop an academic vision and mission statement; 2) to form a plan for fiscally sustainable growth through an array of forward looking academic programs and include signature hands experiences, as well as address the need for coherence and coordination between academic units configured toward the future; 3) outline initiatives that will increase enrollment, retention and four year graduation rates ensuring academic needs and insuring the success of all students; and 4) to build a path toward progress on entrepreneurial collaborative applied research that includes pedagogy and service to the profession that broadens access, promotes student learning and success and enhances the intellectual life of our students, faculty and staff.

5.3 Development of Annual Review of Academic Metrics (11:20am) (20 min)

Provost and VP for Academic Affairs and Strategic Enrollment

Dr. Mott discussed data needs and what is readily accessible and what is not. Dr. Mott also shared the key performance indicators that were used for developing institutional dashboards a couple of years ago, which have been updated and are included in the packet. Twenty-seven (27) dashboards have been updated each year and provide basic metrics used to evaluate different parts of the institution, and includes enrollment of students, profiles, academics and finance and Human Resources.

Trustee Brown asked to hear from others on the committee concerning this data as the Board will need to respond or guide the leadership based on the information received, rather than relying on anecdotal information. Trustee McClure requested clarification with respect to information provided concerning "Fixed Term – Number of Faculty on Annual Contract as of October 31, 2021" and whether this included adjunct faculty. Dr. Mott responded that the adjuncts are set out separately. Trustee McClure shared that over the last couple of years the number of adjuncts teaching courses have gone up, and that data should be monitored. Dr. Mott said she anticipates changes in those levels next year, as 31 faculty should join.

Trustee Brown advised that the committee should drill down a little bit further to the departmental level, rather than just the school level. He said he likes the idea of melding together information on students, as well as the financials. Trustee Hasty said he is interested in seeing the number of faculty openings right now, and whether that number is

continuing to grow or is it stagnant. Dr. Mott replied that this is a rolling number because we have faculty leave throughout the year. In Dr. Mott's experience faculty leave at the end of the year and stay through that academic year, which allows for planning.

5.4 Faculty & Staff Vacancies (11:40am) (10 Min) (verbal only) *Provost and VP for Academic Affairs and Strategic Enrollment Joanna Mott & John Harman*

Trustee Brown noted that the issue of faculty and staff vacancies has been raised several times and said he looks forward to initial data and thoughts about where Oregon Tech is headed. Dr. Mott said Oregon Tech is moving briskly with replacing faculty. VP Harman addressed what the university knows and does not know about faculty and staff departures. Trustee Brown asked how Oregon Tech's turnover rates compare to the market. VP Harman it is difficult to find that out in higher education; the university does not have that data yet, but is trying to find that out. Trustee McClure acknowledged staffing challenges at HR and recommended a formal exit interview process. Trustee Minty-Morris inquired about what VP Harman hears his colleagues. VP Harman responded that there is talk that institutions throughout the state are facing challenges with recruiting and retaining faculty and staff, but that institutions are shy to share hard numbers in these areas. VP Harman suggested HR could explore longer-term leadership development and professional engagement efforts that might help retain staff and faculty.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Staffing

The Dean of Online Education and Global Engagement search committee brought three finalists to campus. The external department chair for Natural Sciences search is completed, Nate Bickford has accepted our offer and will start September 1. Multiple faculty searches are at interview, offer or filled stages including the required faculty for accreditation of the Doctor in Physical Therapy program.

Academic Master Plan

The committee work is continuing toward completion. All four charges have been addressed and there are plans for dissemination for feedback from key groups across campus.

Vice Provost Update – Portland Metro campus, OMIC, Research Office

• The Executive Director of the Sponsored Projects and Grants Administration was hired and

began her duties in April 2022. Jane Woodcock has many years of experiencing administering

grants and contracts at Reed College and University of Portland. She will work with faculty and

staff assisting then with the preparation and submission of grant proposals to sponsors in

addition to administering the awards.

The PM campus faculty, staff and students celebrated the university's 75th Anniversary Logo

unveiling in May. In addition to President Nagi, the speaker was a 1955 graduate of Oregon

Tech.

The retrofit of Oregon Manufacturing Innovation Center (OMIC) main building, funded by the EDA grant was completed on time at the end of May. [] The retrofit included constructing a new parking lot with new lighting, adding an elevator and a lift chair, emergency exits, and ADA-compliant doors; connecting the building to the city water and sewer lines; installing a new air conditioning unit to control the temperature in the high bay area of the building; and creating new office spaces for students and visiting researchers. Bids for purchasing research equipment, also funded by the EDA grant, have received and the procurement process is underway. Because of supply chain delays some of the equipment is not expected to arrive until October 2022. The construction of a new Additive Manufacturing Center is underway. This building is scheduled for completion by September

Library

Library OER Grants

The library is awarding 8 open educational resource (OER) grants this year for the creation, adaptation, or adoption of open course materials. Increasing the use of open materials is a key strategy in student success and retention; switching a course from commercial textbooks to OER can decrease withdrawal rates by an average of 29% (Clinton & Khan, 2019), and has even greater benefits for Pell grant recipients and nonwhite students (Colvard, Watson & Park, 2018).

The use of open educational resources supports culturally responsive teaching and furthers social justice goals at the university. The ability to remix OER materials increases the potential for representation in course materials beyond the typical assumptions of textbook authors, who may write for an audience of college students who are heteronormative, able-bodied, middle-class, etc.

For example, one application from Dr. Riley Richards involves making significant revisions to an open textbook for COM 225 (Interpersonal Communication) to incorporate material and examples specifically relevant to OT student's lives. The revision will incorporate material such as narrative experiences (e.g., via podcasts) to bolster the inclusivity of course materials and increase their relevance to our students, especially for our first-generation college students.

Textbook Tales Videos

The library has undertaken a video production project in partnership with Student Involvement and Belonging, ASOIT, and Oregon Tech Broadcasting to raise awareness of the benefits of open educational resources (OER). Student interviews will take place in the library for students to share their experiences with commercial textbook costs, specifically how the cost of textbooks and access codes may have impacted their personal well-being and/or academic performance. These videos will be published on the Oregon Tech Library's YouTube channel and will be shared with the Oregon Tech Community to increase awareness of textbook affordability initiatives on campus, including the OER program at the OTLibrary, and the Textbook Depot program run by SIB.

IEEE Xplore Digital Library

The library has a new subscription database, IEEE *Xplore*, through an "articles on-demand" agreement that provides access to a maximum of 950 article downloads per year. IEEE (pronounced "I triple E") produces over 30% of the world's electrical engineering, electronics, and computer science literature. Our Xplore subscription provides access to over 260 IEEE journals in full text and over 4 million

<u>conference papers</u>. Subjects covered in the database pertain to both the college of ETM and the college of HAS, and include:

Oregon State Library Collection Enhancement Grant

The library received a grant of \$5,000 to enhance collections targeted for underserved student populations. The grant funds were divided between course textbook reserves and enhancing DEI-focused collections.

The Oregon Tech library purchased \$4,000 in current textbooks and course materials. This provides low-income students course materials on the first day of courses available through the library's reserves system. The library has received current-year bookstore data covering course enrollment, required textbooks, and textbooks costs. Library staff expanded course reserves by identifying top enrolled courses and highest priced textbooks.

Additionally, the library spent \$1,000 towards addressing issues in diversity, inclusion, and increasing a sense of belonging for OIT BIPOC students. The library expanded its non-textbook collection to reflect our broadening diverse student population. The library is undertaking rebuilding its collection by valuinga range of coverage in perspectives, authorship, audience, and subject matter. We recognize that the diverse community the library serves needs inclusive collections which are foundational for learning anda basis for the creation of new knowledge.

Registrar's Office

The Registrar's office is focused on commencement and end of year documentation

The Registrar and several faculty are involved in the state level initiative multi-year common course number work.

STRATEGIC ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT (Admissions, Financial Aid, Advising and Retention, Educational Partnerships and Outreach - EPO)

Staffing

Several positions are at various stages of the search/hire process including two Assistant Director positions. Academic Advising and Retention has recently lost three staff. We are moving as quickly as possible to post and refill.

Financial aid

- As we close out the 21-22 academic year, we had Federal Work-study funds remaining. We were able to transfer over \$80,000 to SEOG and award needy Pell eligible students additional grant money.
- We disbursed \$3,280,554 in HEERF funds to students in the 21-22 academic year (we have \$3,734,703)
 - The Financial Aid office still has an open position for an office specialist. We have had one failed search and are on a second.
 - The Oregon Tech Foundation awarded 180 scholarships worth over \$576,000 for the winter process. We will know the amount of the summer awards by late June.
 - We just finished our last Owls' Worth financial literacy session of the year. We held 4 each term for a total of 12 sessions. We had 206 students that attended at least one session. We have been focusing on topics that will be useful for students both while in school and after graduation. Some of the sessions were:
 - Accepting Job Offers

- Building Credit
- Understanding Mortgages
- Budgeting
- Scholarship Night
- We have continued to work closely with admissions in incentivizing not deposited students for the fall.

Academic Advising and Retention

- Staffing crisis has hit the advising office. 3 staff members are leaving in the month of June (Brandon, Michael and Miria)
- This will leave us with one first-year advisor and one embedded.
- Meeting with Wendy and Ashlie regarding Civitas support and roll out this is our first meeting with more to follow.
- With limited staff, our focus is on fall registration and Civitas.
- Lately we have been feeling the pressure from faculty and others to take on more but we are strapped. Online advising and ETM online support taken on since Maureen is unavailable during the summer months.
- Registration reports begin this week with follow up to department chairs.

Admissions

Enrollment data is included in the full board packet and will be discussed in more detail in the enrollment report.

- First year deposits are flat. We are working on anti-melt including increased communication
 throughout the summer, and the Choose Oregon Tech scholarship for Oregon students. We are
 also leveraging EAB Deposit IQ to communicate with students likely to deposit with a CTA to
 deposit by June 1.
- Transfers are down, but much less so at Portland Metro. We think this is likely do to regional community college enrollment change variations. KCC saw a 32% drop in enrollment since 2019, RCC 35% and Umpqua 22%. While PCC saw a 23% decline, Chemeketa 20%, Clackamas 12% and Mt Hood 18%.
- Looking to next year we are exploring ways to expand our communications campaign, in particular reaching younger students (freshman & sophomores) and giving them helpful, personalized, relevant information about searching for colleges. We are also looking at ways to

diversify where we get our top funnel leads to improve conversion rates. We're in the initialstages of data analysis to compare conversion rates by sources.

Education Partnerships and Outreach (EPO)


Dual Credit – EPO is seeing a steady pattern of enrollment throughout our dual credit program. We enrolled 1,274 students this spring which is up about 100 students from last spring. As we close out the year, we are surveying faculty and high school teachers regarding their experiences with Oregon Tech's dual credit program. We hope to better understand how we can serve our K12 dual credit teachers and faculty. Summer is a busy time to prep for the academic year and EPO will be focusing on program improvements throughout the summer for dual credit.

The merger of <u>Willamette Promise</u> and <u>NW Promise is moving forward</u>. These two accelerated credit programs are led by metro-area Educational Service Districts. Oregon Tech has partnered with each program to offer several dual credit courses. These two programs will merge under Willamette Promise. Oregon Tech will continue to offer the same credit and intends that service levels will stay consistent into the 2022-2023 academic year.

MESA – Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) is a national after school program supporting early STEM experiences for middle and high school students. Oregon Tech expanded to Klamath Falls this fall. We recently received \$55,000 from Ford Family Foundation to continue to support this expansion. We are working to identify schools that will participate next year. As noted in our winter update, DEMO Day was a big success. Oregon Tech's Marketing Department produced this video to showcase the event.

Pre-College Programming – Summer planning is well underway for summer pre-college camps. In Klamath Falls, we will offer two-weeks of LEGO camps for elementary aged students and a one-week residential camp to support career interest in GIS/Surveying as a career. The residential camp is supported by a generous grant from ODOT totaling \$49,997 and the LEGO camps are supported with \$10,000 from Oregon community Foundation. In Wilsonville, we are working to coordinate programming associated with the South Metro Salem Ignite Healthcare funding received through Oregon Community Foundation.

Transfer – EPO has been hosting on site advising hours for some of our CC partners and continue to offer virtual transfer advising hours. We hosted "Tech to Transfer" Day at our Portland-Metro campus in early May and are working diligently to build out our summer projects to better understand the barriers our transfer students face and provide some opportunities to partner more seamlessly for transfer students.

Athletics

- Lady Owls softball team claimed the Cascade Conference regular-season, CCC Tournament, and NAIA Opening Round Bracket championship and will travel to Columbus, Ga., for the NAIA Softball World Series, May 26-June 1...the team is ranked No. 4 in the NAIA and has a 49-11 overall record...Sarah Abramson was named CCC Pitcher of the Year; Abramson, McKenna Armantrout, Kennedy Jantzi, Jayce Seavert, Kaila Mick, Mckenzie Staub and Maggie Buckholz were named to the All-CCC Team; with Armantrout, Jantzi and Aubrie Businger named to the Gold Glove Team...Greg Stewart was named CCC Coach of the Year for the eight time.
- Owls baseball team finished the season with a 30-25 record the most wins by an OIT baseball squad since 2009...Kaleb Keelean was named to the All-CCC team, while Keelean and Mitchel Swanson were Gold Glove Team recipients

Housing & Residence Life

- Choose my Room is happening for all current residents who completed their housing and meal plan applications by the April deadline. This means students are actively choosing where they want to lie on campus next year. This will open for our incoming students over the summer.
- Facilities staff and the custodial team continue to maintain a high standard of cleanliness and
 upkeep in housing. This has become a delicate balance as some supplies are seeing shortages. The
 team is doing well to use products appropriately but not to excess, and have been willing to try
 alternatives if needed.
- We are gearing up for a busy summer!
 - We are hosting guest for each in person New Wings and are excited to show off our spaces to our incoming students and their families/guests.
 - Hosting 2 student camps this summer
 - Will have a solid number of students remaining in on-campus housing as they take classes, and/or work on campus or in the community in support of their educational goals.
 - Plans to finish the renovation of 3BN are underway with new carpet going into these room along with the 3B lobby. And some rooms on 1st floor will get the new style of desk installed as well as new chairs.
 - Every lobby window will be replaced in the Res Hall, making the windows safe to open but removing access to the ledges
 - The Village painting not complete last summer will be completed

Integrated Student Health Center

- Counseling staff have had full schedules (no available appointments) for the past 3 weeks and new clients just keep coming
- ISHC facilitated Tuberculosis testing for over to 60 MIT Juniors to complete their requirements for their upcoming externships this month – this requires them to come to ISHC 4 times across a two week period
- Employee cases of COVID are on the rise while student positives have remained relatively low

- Standard Response Protocol Through the recent execution of a Notice of Intent (NOI) and Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the I Love U Guys Foundation, Oregon Tech has initiated steps to adopt the Standard Response Protocol for Higher Education (SRP-HED) as a core element of its emergency preparedness framework. Programmatic roll-out will take place in the Fall of 2022.
